A STUDY ON PERFECTION AMONG UG AND PG STUDENTS

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ABSTRACT

The present study explored to find out the perfection among UG and PG students. A stratified sample of 2923 UG and PG students were selected in 6 revenue districts viz., Coimbatore, Erode, Karur, Madurai, Tirunelvli and Thiruppur. Data was analyzed by t-test. Findings revealed that there is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students in terms of course level and type of college.

NEED FOR THE STUDY

Webster's Revised Unabridged Dictionary (1913) defines "Perfection as the quality or state of being perfect or complete, so that nothing requisite is wanting; entire development; consummate culture, skill, or moral excellence; the highest attainable state or degree of excellence; maturity; as, perfection in an art, in a science, or in a system; perfection in form or degree; fruits in perfection'.

Perfection seen in college students typically stems from one of two places: themselves or the people around them. Others who influence them may include family persons, teachers, administrators, or even peers. Regardless of the source, the students themselves are affected the same. Outside of the family, the most widespread platform that promotes perfection is college and society. The perfect body, social life and relationship are taken as inspiration as to what a college students believes his or her end goal should be.

The college have taught to students, with the most achievements will have the most opportunities. These achievements typically correlate with perfect grades and high test scores. Since parents want their children to be the best, and to push for the highest grades possible. The students need to reflect on the way they view life and consider how much perfection truly matters. In these connections, the students need measurement of perfection.

OBJECTIVES

• To find out the significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with regard to course level and type of college.

HYPOTHESES

1. There is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with respect to residence.

2. There is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with respect to nativity.

Sample

2923 UG and PG students are selected from 22 Arts and Science colleges in Coimbatore, Erode, Karur, Madurai, Tirunelvli and Thiruppur revenue districts in Tamil Nadu state of Tamilnadu by suing stratified sample technique.

Tool

• Multi-dimensional Perfection Inventory constructed and developed by the investigator.

From Table-1, the t-values 2.438 is significant at 0.05 level and 2.890 and 3.139 are significant at 0.01 level respectively. Thus there is significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students in terms of the dimensions 'personal', 'occupational', and 'in-toto'.

Table-1 also depicts that the t-values 1.682, 0.841, and 0.651 are not significant at 0.05 level. It indicates that there is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with respect to the dimensions 'familial', 'community', and 'academic'.

Table-2 reveals that the t-values -2.867, -3.374, and 4.376 are significant at 0.01 level. It indicates that there is significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students due to the dimensions 'personal',

'familial', 'community'.

From Table-2, the t-values 1.015, -0.736 and -0.665 are not significant at 0.05 level. Thus there is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with regard to the dimensions 'academic', 'occupational', and 'in-toto'.

FINDINGS

• There is significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students in terms of the dimensions 'personal', 'occupational', and 'in-toto'.

• There is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with respect to the dimensions 'familial', 'community', and 'academic'.

• There is significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students due to the dimensions 'personal', 'familial', 'community'.

• There is no significant difference in perfection among UG and PG students with regard to the dimensions 'academic', 'occupational', and 'in-toto'.

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
