By building on community assets and achievements, Appreciative Inquiry promotes confidence, collaboration, and sustainable development.

Appreciative Inquiry follows four stages: **Discovery**, where communities identify their strengths and successful experiences; **Dream**, where they create a shared vision for a better future; **Design**, where strategies are developed to achieve that vision; and **Destiny**, where continuous learning, adaptation, and collective action sustain long-term development. This approach emphasizes community ownership, positive thinking, capacity building, and collaborative leadership, making it an effective strategy for achieving sustainable community development.

CONCLUSION
